When someone brings a private sacrifice in the בֵּית (Holy Temple) he must lean upon the animal before it is sacrificed. This "leaning" is called, "סְמִיכָּה"." The owner places his hands on the animal's head and leans down upon it with all his strength.

The מִשְׁנָה brings a disagreement whether or not יוֹם טוֹב is performed on יוֹם טוֹב says (a Festival). יוֹפֵף בֵּן יוֹעֵוֶר.

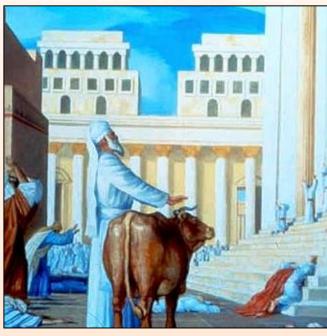
one does not perform יוֹם טוֹב on יוֹם טוֹב. On יוֹם טוֹב, one may not ride on an animal. When one leans all his weight upon the animal it is like riding on an animal. יוֹם עוֹב says one does perform יוֹם טוֹב.

What is interesting about this disagreement is that it was the very first one the Sages of Israel ever had.



Did You Know...

רַבִּי יְהוּדָה בְּרַבִּי נַחְמָנִי says staring at a rainbow, a prince or בּהָנִים while they're blessing the congregation causes one's eyes to "go dim."



יוסף and יוסף בן יועזר שבן יוֹחַגַן were the first generation of group of rabbis known as the "זוגות" or "pairs" who lived early in the days of the Second בית המקדש. Each "pair" of rabbis headed the סְנְהֵדְרִין, Rabbinical court. with rabbi one

serving as the נָשִׂיא, or leader, (lit. "prince") and the other serving as the אַב בֵּית דִּין, or head of the court.

In their generation, יוֹסֵף בֶּן יוֹעֶגֶר was the אַב בֵּית דִּין was the יוֹסֵף בֵּן יוֹחָגָן.

Kevin thought it was wrong, but the fact was lots of kids were starting to do it. After school they would stop at the overpass and spit down at the cars passing underneath. What was worse was that they wore their *kippa*s while they did this and anyone who saw them would know they were Jewish!

Today as he walked home from school, he decided to say something to some of the boys.

"You shouldn't spit off the bridge," admonished Kevin.
"But if you do, remember that the אָקֶהָּ says if a Jew is planning to sin, he should go to a place people don't know him. That way, no one will know he's Jewish when he acts improperly. If you're going to do something a Jew should not do, at least take off your *kippal*."

Sinning-in-Private



We are taught that if someone does not care about the honor of the Creator, it would have been better if he hadn't been born. What does it mean to "not care about the honor of the Creator?"

רב יוֹסֵף explains that someone who sins in secret, but not out in the open, is someone who does not really care about Hashem's honor. By sinning in private he shows that he cares about when *people* think of him...but not about what *Hashem* thinks of him.

קבי יְחוּדָה בְּרַבִּי נַחְמָנִי says, someone may ask himself, who will see me if I sin in private? Who will testify to Hashem that I sinned? The answer is, the stones and beams of one's house where he sinned will testify against him, and this is the meaning of the verse that reads, "בִּי אֶבֶן מִקִיר תִּוְעָק וְכָפִיס מֵעֵץ יַעֲנֶנָה" "for a stone will cry out from a wall and a chip from a beam will testify about it" (חבקוק ב,יא). Hab. 2,11).
