

Inside-the-Daf

Before a girl is married, her father may revoke any vow she makes. Once she is married, only her husband may revoke her vows.

But there are two steps of marriage. The first is called אירוּסין or "betrothal." אירוּסִין is done nowadays when the husband gives his wife an



object of value, like a ring, and declares in front of witnesses that he is now married to her. Such a woman is called an "אֲרוּסָה"

But the marriage isn't complete until the second step called נשואין, or "marriage" is done. Nowadays נשואין is performed when the husband and wife stand under a חופה or wedding canopy. At that point, the couple is fully married.

Who can revoke a woman's vows if she performed אָירוּסָין but not נְשׁוֹאָין? The rule is that both the father and the husband together must revoke the vow and they must do so on the same day they heard about it.

If her father heard of her vow and revoked it, but her husband didn't hear of her vow, and then died, בִית הָלָל say the vow is still effective since the father cannot revoke the husband's part of the vow.



Did You Know...

When a husband or father revokes a vow of an אֲרוּסָה (see "Inside the Daf"), בִּית שַׁמַאי say each "cut away" half of the vow, and בֵּיֹת הְלֵל say they each "weaken" the vow.

Opposite-Statements

The Talmudic sage רְבָה asks, What would happen if the husband (or father) hears the vow of his wife (or daughter) and says, "I confirm and revoke your vow!"

This is a strange thing to say; if a vow is "confirmed" that means it takes effect, if it is "revoked" that means it

> is taken away! How can a vow be both confirmed and taken away at the same time?

> The answer is that the vow is confirmed, but not revoked. That means

it takes effect. The reason is that since one cannot revoke a vow once it is confirmed, a vow that is confirmed and revoked at the same time is also not revoked!

A מדות Moment

"Itzy is misbehaving so much in school. I promised to take him to a carnival this weekend, but I don't think I should," said Itzy's father.

"If something is promised, it shouldn't be taken away," said his friend. "We learn in *daf yomi* that if a husband says his wife's vow is 'confirmed and revoked,' the vow is confirmed and not revoked. We see that once something is confirmed it cannot be revoked. So you shouldn't take away your promise once you've made it!"
