Have you ever made a promise you regretted? יְפְתָּח (Jephthah) certainly did. Before going out to battle the Ammonites, he promised that, when he would return safely from battle, he would sacrifice to Hashem whatever came out of the doors of his house. יְפְתָּח surely had in mind that an animal would emerge from his house which he would then sacrifice. Imagine his shock when his own daughter emerged from the house to greet him!


Now, of course, יְּמָתָּח did not have to keep his promise to sacrifice his daughter. But, nevertheless, he did. The גְּמָרָא quotes this as an example of a risky promise that shouldn't be made.


The אָמֶרָא gives other examples of people who made risky promises. However, with these people, the promise did not result in anything bad.

When אֵלִיעֶּזֶר, the servant of אֲבְרָהָם (Abraham), was searching for a wife for his master's son, he said that whomever would offer drink to both him and his camels would be the right wife. It turned out that רְבְּקָה (Rebecca) did just that and she was a most fitting wife for אֵבְרָהָם's son. But this promise was risky: what if the one who gave drink to אֵלִיעָנֶר and his camels had been improper for marriage? אֵלִיעֶנֶר took a risk he should not have taken.

Similarly, King שָׁאוּל (Saul) promised to give his daughter in marriage to whomever defeated the Philistine giant, גָּלְיָת (Goliath). As it turned out, דָּוִד (David) defeated the warrior and was a worthy suitor for the king's daughter. But what if a lowly person had defeated the Philistine? שַׁאוּל, too, took an improper risk.







# Anatomy of a Torah Scholar

Today's גמרא identifies different qualities of a Torah scholar:

### **LIKE SEEDS**

Just as a seed continues to sprout until its plant has grown completely, so too a Torah scholar continues to grow in his learning once he becomes famous





#### **FIREY**

When a Torah scholar becomes angry, it is because the Torah he has learned causes him to be more sensitive. Even so. he should overcome his anger

#### **STEADFAST**

Any Torah scholar who is not as "hard as iron" is not a true Torah scholar! This means he is not easily swayed by popular opinion

## A Dita Moment

"I can't believe you spilled your drink on me!" exclaimed Yoni. His little brother, Mordechai didn't mean to. He was taken aback at his brother's anger. Mordechai had been looking forward to his return from yeshiva for the summer break and was embarrassed he made him so mad.

Later, Yoni's father pulled him aside.

"In daf yomi we learn that a Torah scholar must teach himself to overcome the trait of anger. When a Torah scholar's knowledge is equal to his good deeds, people will like him. If his knowledge, on the other hand, is more than his deeds, people will not like him. In such a case, the Torah boils inside of him, and, as the גמרא today says, he becomes angry."
