The גְּמָרָא gives an example of a passing army that wreaked havoc on the Jewish community. Pharaoh Necho of Egypt wished to pass through the Land of Israel on his way to attack Assyria. The king of Israel, יֹאשִׁיָּהוּ (Josiah), refused to let him pass.

"What have I to do with you?" asked Pharaoh Necho. "I am not marching against you today!"

But King יאשִיָּהוּ heard that Pharaoh placed his faith in idolatry and decided to do battle with the Egyptians. The יְרְמִיָהוּ explains that יֹאשִׁיָהוּ should have consulted with יִרְמִיָּהוּ (Jeremiah), the prophet before deciding whether or not to go to war. The prophet would have advised against war since the Jewish people were sinful at the time and not deserving of Hashem's protection.

The results were tragic. The Egyptian archers shot through the king so many times that his body became pierced like a sieve.

As he was dying, the prophet יְרְמְיָהוּ saw that יֹרְמְיָהוּ's lips were moving. He came close to hear what the king was saying.

"It is Hashem who is righteous," said יאשיהו, "because I have disobeyed His word."


