Objects that may not be used on the Sabbath or יוֹם טוֹב (Festival) are called "מָקְצֶּה"," or "set aside," because they are "set aside" from being used on these holy days. מְקַצֶּה objects may not be moved on holy days.

Word of the Day: נְינְהוּ "THEY ARE"

סטובל objects include items that are usually used for an activity that is not allowed on the Sabbath or יוֹם טוֹב. For example, a **pestle and mortar** are a bowl and small club used for crushing spices and grains. Crushing is not allowed on the Sabbath and יוֹם טוֹב, so a mortar and pestle are מָקצָה.

However, a pestle is not only used for crushing. One can use a pestle as a surface upon which to chop meat. Chopping meat is allowed on the Sabbath and Festivals.

Any object which is *usually* used for an activity which is not allowed on holy days but which *may* also be used for a permitted activity is called a פָּלִי שֶׁמְלַאכְתוֹ לְאִיסוּר, (a utensil usually used for a forbidden job). A pestle and mortar is an example of a לָאִיסוּר.

The question today is, on the Sabbath and Festival may one move a בְּלִי שֶׁמְלַאְכְתוֹ לְאִיסוֹר (like a pestle) for a permitted activity (like chopping meat)?

say a פָּלִי שֶּׁמְלֵאכְתּוֹ לְאִיסוּר may not be used, even for a permitted activity. בִּית הַלֵּל say it may.

The בְּית הַלֵּל points out that both בְּית הַלֵּל and בִּית הַלֵּל agree that once one is finished using the pestle for cutting meat one may not move it to put it away.

עביי observes that even בית שַׁמַאי would agree you can use a butcher's board for cutting meat on a holy day. A butcher's board is usually used for an activity that is allowed on the Sabbath and יוֹם טוֹב

- chopping meat. It is therefore not מָקצֶה at all.



Did You Know...

Medicines used to be made by grinding herbs, an activity not allowed on the Sabbath. The Sages decreed no medicines may be used on the Sabbath (except in an emergency) because one may come to grind herbs to make the medicine. This included putting on bandages because they used to have medicine in them.

To turn animal hide into leather, it must go through a process called "tanning." Tanning preserves the hides so they do not wear out as quickly. Tanning is one of the activities that is forbidden on the Sabbath and Festivals.

Salting hides also works to tan them. A בְּרֵיְתָא discusses if you are allowed on the

Sabbath or יוֹם טוֹב to salt meat over spread out animal hide. Both בִּית הַלֵּל and בֵּית הַלֵּל agree that one may do this because only a small amount of salt will fall on the hides. The "tanning" that will happen from this is not important.

point out that one may only salt meat in



preparation for roasting because only a small amount of salt is used for this. If you are preparing the meat for cooking, you may not salt it over hides. This is

because heavy salting is needed before meat is to be cooked. We are afraid a large amount of salt will fall onto the hides, tanning them.
