



The Torah says we are not allowed to cook on the Sabbath, but we are allowed to cook on a יום טוֹב (Festival) in order to have food for the Festival.

Why do we have to prepare an עֵרוּב to allow us to cook on the Festival for the Sabbath?

שמואל explains that when a יום טוב falls

out on a Friday, we are worried people will eat all their food on the Festival and leave none over for the Sabbath! We prepare an ערוב תַּבְשִׁילִין to eat on the Sabbath so that this special day is not forgotten. After all, the Torah commands us to "remember the Sabbath day" (שמות בעות), Ex. 20,8). By making sure we have food to eat on that day, we make sure the Sabbath is not forgotten!

What happens if a Festival falls on a Friday? Can one cook on the Festival in order to have food for the Sabbath?

The answer is yes, but there is a catch: before the Festival begins the Sages say we must prepare an ערוב תַּבְשִׁילִין, or "mixture of cooked dishes." According to בִּית שַׁמַאי, we must prepare two cooked dishes, and according to בִּית הַלֵּל, we must prepare one.

Moment מְדוֹת A Moment

It was that time of the synagogue service. The rabbi's speech. Every Sabbath, the children in the synagogue would make a mass exodus from the sanctuary just before the rabbi spoke words of Torah to the congregation.

This time, Noah's father stood in his way.

"Noah," he said, "you're going stay here and listen to the rabbi's speech."

"Why?" said Noah, unhappy with this inconvenient change in his schedule.

"Because of what the נְּמָרָא says. The sage, רַבִּי אֱליעֶזָר became very upset when people left his class in the middle. רַבִּי אֱלִיעֶזַר gave a curse to the last group who left. When they left, the lecture hall looked empty showing that the people did not view a Torah lecture as important! That's why I want you to stay for the rabbi's speech. If you leave, it is like you are making a statement that Torah lectures are not important!"

Did You Know...

בְּי יְהוֹשֵׁע says, one should divide every Festival into half: One half should be spent for one's own pleasure (eating, drinking, sleeping) and one half should be spent for Hashem (praying, learning Torah).




Cutting Class
