Yesterday we learned that רָבִּי מֵאִיר holds an animal may not act as a wall for a סוּכָּה.

In today's רָבִּי מֵאִיר gives two reasons for רַבִּי מֵאִיר's opinion.

The first reason is that רַבִּי מֵאִיר holds that any wall that is held up by air (like breath) is not a valid wall. Rashi explains that this is because the wall isn't standing by its own strength but rather by something with no substance. Since an animal exists by virtue of its breath, it would not be a valid סוֹבָּה wall.

ירב אַחָא בַּר יַּצְקֹב second reason is that a סוּכָּה wall must be man-made. Animals are not man-made and so may not form a סוּכָּה wall.

The difference between רֵב אַחָא בַּר יַּצְקֹב's explanations can be seen if a balloon is used as a סוּכָּה wall. According to the first reason (a סוּכָּה wall can't be held up by air) the wall would not be סוּכָּה (valid). According to the second reason (סוֹכָּה walls must be manmade) the balloon wall would be valid since it was blown up by a man.

This is because we 'sway' easily toward evil. The lesson of the סִיּיִם walls is how we must stand firm and not sway back and forth in directions we shouldn't be going in."

"I know," said Sammy. "Next time I won't 'sway' so easily!"

No Swaying



Our מְשְׁנֵה teaches that trees may be used as סובה walls.

In the סוּכָּה walls must be walle to endure a normal wind without swaying back and forth. The גְּמָרָא asks how then can we allow trees to be walls? Don't they sway back and forth in the wind? The גְּמָרָא answers that we must be allowing only tree trunks that are stiff to be a סוּכָּה wall. These trunks don't sway in the wind.

The גְּמֶרָא still questions this allowance. After all, even if we use a tree trunk as a wall don't its branches sway back and forth? The גְּמֶרָא answers that we must weave the branches together with branches of palm and bay trees. The weaving will prevent the branches from swaying.



Did You Know...

Even though רַבִּי יְהוּדָה is not worried that an animal being used as a סוּכָּה wall might die, we find he is worried that the wife the יוֹם כָּפוּר (High Priest) may die right before יוֹם כָּפוּר.
