Imagine you had to take a very important test. You would probably spend a lot of time studying and reviewing the material.

The יוֹם כְּפוּר service that the בֹהֵן גָדוֹל had to perform was very important. On each of

the seven days before the holiday he had to review the Torah portion about the יוֹם כפור service.

The מִשְׁנָה tells us that the Elders of the בֵּית דִּין (Court) would read these Torah portions to the פֿהֵן גָּדוֹל. They would then ask him to read them himself in case he had forgotten them, or never learned them.

The נְּמָרָא wonders how there could have been a פֿהֵן גָּדוֹל who had never before learned these sections. A פֿהֵן גָדוֹל was required to be wiser than regular people!

The גְּמָרָא answers that the מִּשְׁנָה is talking about בּהֲנִים גְּדוֹלִים of the Second Temple period. It was normal at this time for the position of to be sold to the highest bidder. These בּהֵנִים גְּדוֹלִים would not be learned.

רֵב אַסִי tells a story of a wealthy widow, מֵרְתָּא, the daughter of בַּיִיתּוֹס who paid 9 pounds (4 kg) of gold dinars to King ינַּאי to appoint her future husband, פֿהֵן גָּדוֹל as יָהוֹשָׁעַ בֶּן גַּמְלָא.

A מדות Moment

"I didn't do it on purpose!" Haim protested.


"I know," said Elisha. "Still, you shouldn't have lied about it and should apologize to Daniel."

Before a president or a prime minister takes office, he or she must swear an oath. In this oath they promise to uphold the laws of the land and serve their country faithfully.

The לוֹם כָּפּוּר took a similar oath before יוֹם כָּפּוּר would take that the elder בּהְנִים would take him to a room in the בִּית הַמִּקְדָּשׁ (Holy Temple) called the לִשְׁכַּת בֵּית אַבְטִינָס.

In this room they would show the פֿהֵן גָּדוֹל how to handle the קֿטֹרֶת (incense) properly. The פֿהֵן גָּדוֹל had to swear that he wouldn't change anything the elders taught him.

Name:

This was a very important oath to take because in the time of the Second Temple, there were פֿהָנִים שׁלִים אוֹלִים (Saducees), Jews who did not believe in the תּוֹרָה שֶׁבְּעֵל פֶּה (Oral Torah). Because of their misguided beliefs they would perform the יוֹם כִּפּוֹר (Service) of יוֹם כִּפּוֹר improperly. The elder בֹהֵנְיִם needed to make sure the בֹהֵנְיִם in front of them was not a צְדוֹקִי.

After the פֿתֵן גְּדוֹל took this oath, he would turn aside and cry because he was suspected of being a Sadducee. The elders would also turn and cry that they had to be so suspicious!

Did You Know...

A פֿהֵן נָדוֹל had to be superior to the other בּּרַיְיתָא in four areas: strength, looks, wisdom and wealth.

The מִשְׁנָה teaches that before יום פפור, the elders of בית דִּין (court) would pass bulls, lambs and rams (and goats) before the פֿהֵן גָּדוֹל - to make him reflect about the אֲבוֹדָה of tomorrow.
