But have you ever been tempted to worship a statue? Probably not. So how could our ancestors have been so tempted to do something so ridiculous?

The answer is found in today's גָּמֶרָא. You see, we all have a יֶצֶר הָרָע (evil impulse) that tempts us to sin. It used to be that the יצר הַרַע was very strong for idolatry. In fact, this sin was the reason for the destruction of the First

בית הַמְּקְדַּשׁ (Holy Temple).

The Jewish people begged Hashem to get rid of the temptation to serve idols. They declared "We do not want this evil impulse, nor the reward we get for overcoming it!"

After three days and nights of the people fasting, the יצר הרע was delivered to them in the form of a fiery lion cub leaving the קָדֶשׁ הַקַּדָשִׁים (Holy of Holies) in the Temple. The people took this lion and sealed it in a lead cauldron from which the sound of its roar cannot be heard.

are allowed to wear כֹּהַנִים their special בָּגְדֵי כָהוּנַה (Kohen clothing) inside the (Holy Temple) בֵּית הַמְּקִדּשׁ even when they are not involved in Temple duties. They may not, however, wear these clothes outside the Temple premises.
